THE TERM NOM DE PLUME IS ACTUALLY ENGLISH

The term nom de plume is derived from the actual french term nom de guerre, literally "war name", a name that French soldiers would take on when enlisting in the army.

The British eventually came to use nom de guerre to mean any pseudonym (another word borrowed from French).

The first mention in the oxford English dictionary of nom de plume (feather name) was in the 19th century novel oliver Goldfinch by Victorian novelist Emerson Bennet.
